School Zone Reminder

The speed limit for vehicles traveling within a school zone is 15 miles per hour. The 15 mile per hour limit is defined by Wisconsin State Statute.



- 346.57(4)(a) Fifteen miles per hour when passing a schoolhouse at those times when children are going to or from school or are playing within the sidewalk area at or about the school.
- 346.57(4)(b) Fifteen miles per hour when passing an intersection or other location properly marked with a "school crossing" sign of a type approved by the department when any of the following conditions exists:
 - 1. Any child is present.
 - 2. A school crossing guard is within a crosswalk at the intersection or the other location or, if no crosswalk exists, is in the roadway at the intersection or the other location.
 - 3. A school crossing guard is placing in or removing from the roadway at or near the intersection or the other location a temporary sign or device that guides, warns, or regulates traffic.

The Lodi Police Department patrols and monitors the school zones around all our school buildings to ensure the safety of the students going to and from school. Fines for any moving violation that occur in a school zone are doubled. Please be cognizant of school zones and slow down and drive with extra caution when traveling through a school zone or crossing.

If the form is faxed or emailed, the original document must follow postmarked no later than January 3, 2023. Wis. Stat. §§ 8.10(5), 8.21, 8.30(4), 120.06(6)(b), Wis. Admin. Code EL § 6.04.

New Candidates

File a campaign registration statement before campaign funds are collected or spent. Wis. Stat. §§ 11.0202(1)(a), 11.0101(1).

Continuing Candidates

Amend your current registration, including the office sought and the new election and primary dates. Wis. Stat. §§ 11.0202 (1)(a), 11.0101(1).



Complete and submit a *Declaration of Candidacy* (Form EL-162sd) to the filing officer no later than 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, January 3, 2023, or the candidate's name will not be placed on the ballot. If the form is faxed or emailed, the original document must follow, postmarked no later than January 3, 2023. Wis. Stat. §§8.10(5), 8.21, 8.30(4), Wis. Admin. Code EL § 6.04

What is fentanyl?

FENTANYL is a deadly synthetic opioid that is being pressed into fake pills or cut into heroin, cocaine, and other street drugs to drive addiction.

Why is fentanyl so dangerous?

DEA lab testing reveals that four out of every ten fake pills with fentanyl contain a potentially lethal dose.



FENTANYL IS MORE POTENT THAN HEROIN



What are the physical and mental effects

of fentanyl?

Fentanyl use can cause confusion, drowsiness, dizziness, nausea, vomiting, changes in pupil size, cold and clammy skin, coma, and respiratory failure leading to death.

Tips for Parents & Caregivers

- Encourage open and honest communication
- Explain what fentanyl is and why it is so dangerous
- Stress not to take any pills that were not prescribed to you from a doctor
- No pill purchased on social media is safe
- Make sure they know fentanyl has been found in most illegal drugs
- Create an "exit plan" to help your child know what to do if they're pressured to take a pill or use drugs

What are fake pills?

The Sinaloa Cartel and Cartel de Jalisco Nueva Generacion are making fentanyl and pressing it into fake pills. Fake pills are made to look like OxyContin*, Xanax*, Adderall*, and other pharmaceuticals. These fake pills contain no legitimate medicine.



How would my child get fentanyl?

Drug traffickers are using social media to advertise drugs and conduct sales. If you have a smartphone and a social media account, then a drug trafficker can find you. This also means they are finding your kids who have social media



District and State Budget Cycle

A school district is continuously managing more than one budget at any one time. A school's fiscal year begins on July 1 and ends on June 30, versus the calendar year, which begins on January 1 and ends on December 31. Currently, schools are operating under the second year of the State of Wisconsin's Biennial Budget.


The State of Wisconsin's budget covers a 2-year period from July 1 of one odd-numbered year through June 30 of the next odd-numbered year. Development of the biennial budget involves a nearly year-long process. In the fall of the even-numbered year, state agencies submit budget requests to the Department of Administration. Requests are compiled by the State Budget Office for review by the Governor. The Governor is required by law to deliver the budget message to the new legislature on or before the last Tuesday in January, although the legislature can extend the deadline at the Governor's request.

To meet the state's budgetary cycle, the budget should be signed and effective by July 1 of the odd-numbered year. If there is a delay, state agencies operate at their appropriation authority from the prior budget until the new budget is in effect.

District Enrollment


Wisconsin public school districts are required to count pupils for membership purposes on the third Friday in September and second Friday in January and report the data to the Department of Public Instruction (DPI). Student count is very important for school districts as it is a key factor in determining revenue, state aid and staffing levels. In the past several years the School District of Lodi enrollment has stabilized at just under 1500 students. The following chart "School District of Lodi Enrollment History," illustrates the Lodi's enrollment over the past 20 years.



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Mill Rate History

At the 2022 School District of Lodi Annual Meeting, held on October 24, 2022, the school district released the 2022-2023 all funds Mill Rate. This year, the district mill rate decreased 1.15 Mills, from 11.11 in 2021-2022 to 9.96 in the current year. The following chart "Lodi Mill Rate History" illustrates Lodi's historical mill rates from 2008 to the present.



Referendum Project Listings

Lodi taxpayer's approved a 5-year, \$5.98 million/year non-recurring referendum to maintain operations in April of 2022. The total amount of this referendum is \$29.9 million dollars, of which \$2.13 million/year or \$10.65 million dollars was approved for capital projects in the areas of facility improvements and technology updates. 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Preparing for the Future - School District of Lodi Exceeds Expectations on State Report Card



The Department of Public Instruction (DPI) is required by state statute (Wis. Stat. 115.385) to generate school and district report cards for every publicly funded school and district in the state. The report cards are intended to help schools and districts use performance data to celebrate success and improve their efforts to prepare students for their futures. These report cards include data on multiple indicators for multiple years across four priority areas (Achievement, Growth, Target Group Outcomes, and On-track to Graduation). Based on its


score, a school or district receives one of five rating categories, from *Fails to Meet Expectations* to *Significantly Exceeds Expectations*. Once again, the School District of Lodi received a rating from the state of Exceeds Expectations. Lodi High School, Lodi Middle School, & Lodi Elementary School also received ratings of Exceeds Expectations. Ouisconsing School of Collaboration (OSC) received a rating of Meets Expectations. Internally, our teams have had the opportunity to analyze these reports to celebrate areas of success and be responsive to areas we self-identify for growth. Did you know... During the 2020/2021 school year, 45.5% of Lodi High School students successfully completed at least one Advanced Placement course. The state average during this same timeframe was 19.9%! WOW! Also, during this same time period, students at Lodi High School engaged in music and art courses at a higher rate than the state average.



<u>Supporting District Workforce</u> - School District of Lodi Awarded \$12,500 Peer Review Mentoring Grant

Providing mentoring to our newest educators is a key component of attracting and retaining high-quality staff. The School District of Lodi was recently awarded \$12,500 through the 2022/2023 Peer Review Mentoring Grant project. The intent of this grant is to support public school districts in developing or refining peer review and mentoring support programs for initial educators. The bulk of our allotment will be allocated to mentor stipends so that our amazing veteran educators can support those new to the School District of Lodi.



<u>Preparing for the Future/Operational Excellence -</u> Career & Technical Education

During the strategic planning process, the community asked the School District of Lodi to continue to analyze and further develop Career and Technical Education (CTE) programming for our students. As an initial step in this process, administrators, CTE teachers, counselors, and a few Board members held a session with a senior research analyst from the Department of Workforce Development (DWD) in an attempt to better understand current and future labor market information for our region. We are truly thankful that the DWD was willing to hold this free informational session for our team to develop a foundational understanding prior to our planning process.

Do you remember where you were the first time you watched *The WIzard of Oz*? If you were a kid in the 1970's like I was, you had only one chance each year, so the annual airing of *The Wizard of Oz* on network television was a family event. It's amazing that a movie originally released back in 1939 had the power to enthrall me with its magical characters, wicked witch and flying monkeys—and it still does. I guess that's what makes it a classic. These days, when anyone can easily stream *The Wizard of Oz*, it remains a family favorite. That's why Director Erica Bardwell chose it for this year's Lodi High School musical.

Overall, 89 students from three different schools are involved in Lodi's production of *The Wizard of Oz*. Many are performing on stage and in the orchestra pit, while others are behind the scenes with stage crew, sound, and lighting. Something especially unique about this year's play is that twenty of the cast members making their stage debut are



students at the Primary or Elementary School. In addition, 37 parents and volunteers from the community help make the show possible by building sets, coordinating effects, designing costumes, performing music, and managing the stage. The production is a collaborative effort that requires a huge commitment from everyone involved.

The musical is a community effort as well. This year, Electronic Theater Controls loaned the school a sound board, light board, and lights. They even provided a team to help hang the lights. All totaled, Lodi High School used almost \$200,000 in loaned equipment. A huge thank you to Electronic Theater Controls!

When the curtain goes up and you're captivated by the play, it's easy to forget about all the work that led up to the performance. For the high school students involved, being part of the musical means committing to three months of daily rehearsals and lessons while maintaining good grades in challenging courses and participating in other co-curricular activities. They have to stay organized and balance the rigorous time demands of their busy schedules. Thirty-three of our musical students were involved in a sport, with all eight fall sports represented. Pillar 1 - Preparing for the Future

Exploring academic and career excellence for diverse futures through opportunity, relevance, & readiness.

As a school district, we are dedicated to providing students opportunities to plan for their future and explore careers. Lodi Middle School implements this vision by providing students opportunities to reflect on their strengths, interests, and possible careers linked to these. Although middle schoolers are several years away from entering a career, we can take steps to help students understand themselves and the types of careers they may be interested in pursuing.

One way that we carry out our community's vision is by utilizing a program called Xello. The goal of using Xello is to deliver personalized engagement for students when thinking about their future, specifically careers. Students create self-knowledge through a series of assessments that help the Xello program understand the student's interests. From here, Xello creates a career profile for each student and career clusters that match their interest and skill set. In addition, Xello informs students what educational path they would need to pursue in order to enter these careers, whether that is an apprenticeship, 2-year degree, or 4-year degree. All of these help to educate students on different types of careers and which ones match their interest.

In addition to using Xello, Lodi Middle School looks for opportunities outside of our school walls. This school year the 6th grade team took a field trip to the Wisconsin Science Festival at the UW-Madison Discovery Center. Students were able to participate in real world learning experiences pertaining to future careers in science and ask questions of the professionals that experience science daily. In November, 7th grade students will be attending the Future Quest career expo in Madison to create career awareness around career clusters. At the career expo, students will be able to experience what it would be like to have a job in different fields, such as construction or in a hospital. In May, 8th grade students will attend a Career and College Fair at Madison College. Students will be able to visit tables that will get them information about careers such as machining, nursing, childcare, and biotech. In addition, students will be given information about educational opportunities to pursue that career.

Although full time careers are a way off for middle school students, it is important for them to begin the process of learning about different career paths. Learning about these career paths will help students plan for future academic work or additional career planning in high school and beyond. Our role in this is to support students in reflecting on their skills and interests in order to help them create career readiness. By providing students with opportunities to learn about careers, we are also helping them to plan for their future opportunities and paths to get to those careers.

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6th Grade Field Trip - Wisconsin Science Festival

6th grade students attended the Wisconsin Science Festival at the UW Madison Discovery Center. Students were engaged in hands-on stations that covered all areas of science, life science, physical science, earth and space science and engineering. Students were able to participate in real world learning experiences pertaining to future careers in science and ask questions to the professionals that experience science daily.







8th Grade - Career Fair at Madison College - May 2022

On May 3, 2022, the 8th grade class had the opportunity to attend a Career and College Fair at Madison College. They visited a variety of program tables (machine tool, nursing, childcare, biotech) and toured the Truax Building. A highlight of the trip for many 8th graders was learning that they could begin taking college courses during their junior year of high school. In addition, on our tour when we went to the "Machine Lab" area we got several tours of different sections.

We are just finishing our first quarter of the 2022-2023 school year and have wonderful things occurring and planned for the coming months!

As a staff we are working on implementing strategies to work towards the five pillars of the District Strategic Plan. Here are a few of the things that we have been focusing on.

- <u>Pillar 1 Preparing Our Students for the Future</u> Staff were able to participate in some professional development opportunities in early August and October around guided reading and phonics instruction. We were able to have Dr. Jan Richardson return to the Primary School on November 3 to help grade level teams with planning for our small group instruction. This was a huge success! The purpose of Big Buddies is for High School students to serve as positive role models and mentors for younger students in our community. The Big Buddies will meet once a month at the Primary School. The students will participate in fun activities and engage in friendly conversation on various topics to get to know each other.
- <u>Fall Fest and Halloween Parade</u> Each year 4K families are invited after school to partake in the 4K Fall Fest that includes a costume parade and then other fall activities. Students in grades K-2 then do a costume parade on October 31 outside of the school for families to come and watch and take pictures.







• <u>Shooting Stars</u> - Similar to last year, I want to continue to work on connecting with each of the students at the Primary and their families. I will be selecting 2-3 students as "Shooting Stars." The student comes down to the office where we call home and celebrate the great things that child is doing in the classroom. This year I am asking them to share how they demonstrate "caring hearts and/or curious minds." This

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connects to our school motto. This year the students will then get a chance to sit in a special chair. For grades K-2, they will sit in one of my principal chairs for the day.







• Heritage Park - Last spring our students participated in a fundraiser called Stride With Pride. Students and volunteers walked part of the Ice Age Trail and received donations for completing this walk. Our families and community members were very generous and we were able to earn \$5,473! With these funds, and with previous funds that we had earned, we will be purchasing a final add on to Heritage Park. Our hope is that this will be installed this coming Spring so that students and families in the area can stop by and use this equipment.



- Mileage Club Mileage Club is returning to the Primary School! A special thanks to Diana Karls and Heidi Endres, for writing a grant to receive money for this! During recess, our grade K, 1 and 2 students can choose to run around a .25 mile loop on the playground and earn special prizes when they complete 5 miles.
- Opera for the Young On October 14, Lodi Primary School joined the Elementary/OSC School for the Opera For The Young's performance of "The Barber of Seville." Not only did we show the OFTY performers that we were excellent audience members, we were also able to sing along with the opera cast on four songs. Our Lodi Musicians were amazing!
