Thank You

The voters in the School District Lodi approved a non-recurring annual operating referendum of \$5.98 million for each of the next five years on Tuesday, April 5, 2022. The operating referendum consisted of two parts, \$3.85 million for operations and \$2.13 million for maintenance and technology upgrades. The operations part of this referendum will be used to preserve the high level of achievement that our community has come to expect by allowing the District to maintain our current level of instructional, career and technical education, STEAM, and extracurricular programming while also allowing the District to focus on attracting and retaining staff. The maintenance and technology upgrades portion of the referendum will allow the District to replace the roofs at both the Lodi Elementary School/OSC School and Lodi High School, upgrade HVAC controls systems at Lodi Middle School and Lodi Elementary School/OSC, reconstruct the track, along with upgrading cabling, wifi, and addressing other technology needs within the District.

The District has already taken steps moving toward next year based on the community's support of the referendum. You may have noticed that the District posted positions shortly after the referendum passed. These are not new positions for the District, but positions that have come open due to staff retirements or resignations and will help to keep us fully staffed going into the 2022-2023 school year. The Board has also approved staff compensation consistent with what was shared in the referendum materials, attempting to not only help our staff keep up with our neighboring districts, but to catch up slightly. This action, which takes steps to attract and retain exceptional team members, aligned directly with the priorities that were shared by the community in the strategic planning process. The maintenance and technology upgrades are also in the works, but will not begin until the spring and summer of 2023.



The District is so grateful to the community for their support of our students, our families, and our staff. The strong partnership between our families, our community, and our District continues to be a necessary component in the education of all of our students. The community's support of the referendum speaks directly to the District's mission: "In partnership with our community, nurturing every student's potential for growth and opportunities - socially, mentally, & academically- in a safe, respectful, and an inclusive environment to create innovative problem solvers." This only occurs through our partnership with our community. A partnership that benefits all of us, but most importantly the students in the School District of Lodi.

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Stadium Turf Field Brings Money, Fun to Lodi

The Lodi Community is reaping the benefits of having a turf field in the Lodi High School Stadium. Not only is the turf field an incredibly functional athletic field, but it also provides a highly conducive environment for High School Physical Education & Music classes, community recreation & wellness activities, Lodi youth athletic competitions, and summer camps & clinics.

Recently, the Lodi Youth Soccer program hosted a soccer games drawing teams from around the area. The highlight of youth children being able to play on the beautiful Lodi Turf Stadium was not the only perk of the games, but the games went on, even though other area soccer fields were too wet to play on. "Hosting soccer teams from other communities brings revenues to the greater community too," says District Administrator Vincent Breunig, "A tournament, such as this draws commerce from people purchasing gas, coffee, food, and other items while in our community." "Stadium field renters are charged a usage fee, which comes into the school district as revenue offsetting the Community Services Property Tax Levy," explains Lodi School District Business Manager, Brent Richter.

Lodi High School classes are taking full advantage of the stadium turf field as well. "The turf has been a game-changer in PE class," states Michelle Puls, Lodi High School Physical Education Teacher. The turf is utilized almost every day in the fall and spring by the Physical Education and Music classes. It lends itself well to team sports activities, such as Ultimate Frisbee, Flag Football, Lacrosse, and Soccer, where it's not only a great playing surface but can be used before, during, and after heavy rain. "For the most part even with wet weather, the turf stays dry, so no more wet shoes! We were on it this spring when it snowed! I love it!" said Mrs. Puls. Assistant Principal Jason Marshall comments the following, "The artificial turf field is not only an asset to our athletic and music programs, but provides a safe and reliable surface for PE students to utilize during the school day. With this year's wet spring, having a surface with great drainage that is free of mud has allowed us to move our PE classes outside without any concern. A typical spring usually involves discussions of how to minimize damage to fields that haven't fully dried out from the winter, how to promote healthy grass growth, and how to balance the many groups that seek green space. The stadium turf has been a gamechanger giving students and athletes a ready-to-use space as soon as the snow was gone."

The Lodi Community, Recreation, Education, and Wellness (CREW) program hosts numerous programs on the field, such as "Boot Camp," "Youth Cheerleading," "Youth Football," and "My First Sports." These programs are being utilized by children ages 3 to adults in their 80s, says CREW Director Diana Karls. Programs run by Mrs. Karls, have flourished in our community and the introduction of the turf option has propelled her programming to an even higher level with access to a highly functional recreational surface. The CREW program and Lodi Optimist Club partner together to host Lodi's own "One Mother of a Run," on Mother's Day weekend. The Lodi Stadium Turf Field is used for youth-run, adult warm-up areas, and finish areas.

"The school district maintenance department is saving money on the elimination of field painting, mowing costs, and other traditional field preparation," claims Lodi Buildings & Grounds Director, Neal Reible. "While there is a little more clean-up time due to the increase in community usage, the district is able to offset those expenses with usage fees charged to those groups."

Turf Fields are rapidly becoming the norm across Wisconsin and the country. On the Northside of Madison alone,





On the Northside of Madison alone, DeForest Area, Fall River, Lodi, Sauk Prairie, Wisconsin Dells, and Waunakee Community all have installed turf fields, with River Valley putting a turf field on their stadium this summer. The Lodi Stadium turf field, installed in the summer of 2020, cost around \$1.0 million with over \$500,000 being funded by donations.

- **Be Consistent, Firm, and Loving** set boundaries and stick to them! think of ways you can spend time together as a family to foster trust & family bonds

"Little Explorers" program is an outstanding collaboration with the High School staff and students. This year we collaborated with high school teachers Ms. Puls, Ms. Tonn, Ms. Gleiss, Ms. Robarge and their high school students. Our Little Explorers were exposed to art, library, agriculture, fitness and health. This program offers a great "first experience" of learning for 3 and 4 year olds. 

Lodi Business Office Happenings:

Spring is not only a time for personal energy renewal, warmer & longer days, and planning for exciting summer opportunities, but it also holds the time when school contracts are renewed, the ensuing school year budgets are built, and audit preparation begins. School district fiscal years are framed between July 1 and June 30. The Lodi Board of Education will approve a 2022-2023 Preliminary Budget in June. Final 2022-2023 budgets are "adopted" at an October or November 2022 meeting after all necessary financial information has been received by the district.

Highlight on Enrollment:

Student Count (enrollment) is crucial data that the district tracks closely as enrollment is tied to the revenues a district receives. In the simplest form, the more students, the greater revenue potential a school district receives. The following chart illustrates a 20-year history of enrollment in the district.



The Budget Process

(Information taken from Wisconsin DPI website)

The development of a school district's budget is a long-range process that typically consists of seven distinct steps, including a multitude of meetings with staff, administration, board committees, which ultimately result in an "adoption of a final budget".

- Step 1 Development of a "Proposed Budget"
 - The Administration and school board collaborate to develop a proposed budget which identifies expected revenues, expenditures and fund balances for the budget year. The School District of Lodi begins with a budget projection from a third party, non-bias professional organization to support internal decision making processes. School district administration utilizes the Wisconsin DPI recommended budget format to provide to the board in June or July for approval.
- Step 2 Budget Hearing Requirements

 Under the guidance of Wisconsin Statutes \$115.01(3) and Wis Stat \$65.90, the School District of Lodi
 administration presents a "Proposed Budget" to the school board in June or July. This budget is reflective
 of projections taken from known current data and the outcomes of the RW Baird School Finance Budget
 Model.

- Step 3 Annual Meeting Requirements Step
 - Per Wisconsin Statute § 120.08(1)(a), school districts are required to hold an annual meeting. The School District of Lodi's annual meeting, set by the electors at the prior annual meeting, is traditionally held in October, after all known data is available to set the tax levy. Per Wisconsin Statute no annual meeting may be held before May 15 or after October 31.
- Step 4 Original Budget Adoption
 - The school board adopts an "Original Budget" (aka: Final Budget) no later than the tax levy is set under Wis Stat § 120.12. The School District of Lodi traditionally holds a budget meeting after the annual meeting to "adopt a final budget" and "certify the tax levy".
- Step 5 Setting of the Levy and a Sufficient Tax Amount Requirements
 - On or before November 1, a school board must determine if the tax voted at the annual meeting is sufficient to operate and maintain the schools for the school year. If the amount so determined is not sufficient, the school board shall raise the tax, while the board may lower the tax if the amount so determined exceeds requirements. The tax levy shall not exceed limits established by Wis Stat § 121.91
- Step 6 Report the Tax Levy to the Wisconsin DPI
 - A certified tax levy, one voted on by the taxpayers, is required to be reported to the Wisconsin DPI in an early November DPI established deadline.
- Step 7 Budget Changes/Amendments Process
 - Minor budget changes occur during the course of a fiscal year. The budget can be revised by a vote of the school board or in case of significant changes, a ½ vote by the board of education. The school district's hired auditors review budget changes, therein complying with mandatory reporting to the WI DPI.

Cash Flow vs. Fund Balance

We often get asked, "what is Fund Balance?" and "how does it affect Cash Flow?" A simple explanation is that: Fund Balance is a measure of assets minus liabilities. This measurement is taken on June 30. Per state statute, this measure is taken at the end of a school's fiscal year. In the private sector, Fund Balance is known as "Owner's Equity", or simply "Equity". A common misconception is that the fund balance is a cash account and therefore corresponds to the district's bank balance. While cash is an asset, it typically comprises only a portion of the district's fund balance on June 30. Typically, Lodi's Fund Balance is about 60% in cash on hand and 40% booked as receivables, meaning those payments won't be received until sometime in the ensuing months. Cash Flow, is simply defined as the "movement of money in and out of a company" (investipedia.com). If a school district does not have enough funds (cash on hand) to cover its monthly, semi-monthly or regular expense payments, a school district may have to borrow short-term to pay its bills. The School District of Lodi has not had to borrow money for cash flow purposes since around 2001.

The Swing CREW is responsible for the setup and takedown of district spaces for after-school activities, as well as co-curricular and community events. They also complete maintenance and custodial jobs as needed.

Summer Projects & Cleaning:

The Buildings & Grounds team is beginning to make preparations for the summer cleaning season. Summer cleaning is hard work, and fast-paced, which includes heavy lifting and long hours. During the summer, the department adds four seasonal employees to cover all the needs of summer cleaning. Classroom additions, such as technology upgrades are also completed at this time. The big project for the summer is the Middle School HVAC upgrade, which will do a full switch out from the outdated pneumatic controls to a fully digital control system. The school district applied for a \$342,000 grant, which would cover the full system upgrade. Notification of the award should happen by the end of May 2022.

"Transparent Solar Energy," What's that?

Solar Energy is probably the most aggressive technology being discussed by B&G Directors across the state and country. With increased energy and utility bills plaguing schools, it's incumbent on our school leaders to consider every option available. A research group from Michigan State University has developed a new-age technology, called "Transparent Solar Energy." The following is a recent article snipped on what this is and how it works.

Transparent solar is a cutting-edge technology that <u>gathers and uses light energy</u> through windows or any glass surface, regardless of the angle. It has the potential to be a game-changer in terms of broadening the scope of solar.

In terms of engineering, researchers have created several means of transparent solar technology. Most generally though, the majority of them function more as a transparent solar concentrator, which means they are made to absorb specific UV and infrared light wavelengths that aren't visible to the naked eye and transform them into energy capable of powering electronics.

This technology is also called photovoltaic glass, and it's manufactured to provide a ranging level of transparency. Back in 2014, researchers at Michigan State University (MSU) <u>developed the first entirely transparent solar concentrator</u>, which could convert almost any glass sheet or window into a PV cell.

And by 2020, scientists in the United States and Europe have achieved 100 percent transparency for solar glass, bringing us one step closer to the goal of a sustainable future that does not rely on the grid of the fossil fuel industry.

According to Lodi B&G Director Neal Reible, "At this point, the upfront cost of solar power for our district appears to be cost prohibitive and the return on investment is around 10-15 years, but The School District of Lodi will continue to explore every opportunity it can find around energy savings and efficiencies, as well as apply for any grants that may be available."

Food Service Focus

<u>Director's Notes - A Year in Reflection:</u>

On March 1, 2021, the School District of Lodi hired us (Taher, Inc.) to manage its food service program. As we cross the finish line of a full year, I can honestly say the year has been full of accomplishments. Some accomplishments I am specifically proud of are improved student & staff communications, special offers on limited items such as Huevos Rancheros, broadening our students' pallets with "Harvest of the Month" offerings such as Naturally Rooted potatoes, and placing a unique focus on our local "Farm-to-School" programming, with programs like the district wide "Great Apple Crunch" with apples being purchased from local orchards.



We also partnered with "The Little Potato Company", from DeForest, Wisconsin who helped us educate Lodi students about different varieties of potatoes, such as "Creamer Potatoes." The Little Potato Company sponsored a day where they donated four different kinds of potatoes, all seasoned differently, for student meals. The students loved them!

School programming with Food Services program collaboration is one of our primary goals. We've made incredible strides toward achieving this goal. Taher partnered with Connor Anderson's FFA classes to harvest fresh radish microgreens, which were then made into pesto pizza for student lunches. We also partnered with Michelle Howe's Middle School Science classes, which grew two different lettuce products, in their own hydroponic gardens. The Middle School Food Service team used these greens in the Middle School salad bar. These partnerships not only provided a great learning experience, but it also gave the students an opportunity to watch the fruit of their efforts put into real world lunch programs.

Highlight Project "Pig Roast:"

Arguably, the biggest accomplishment of the year was the pig roast we held for the Lodi High School and Middle School. Lodi students were involved with this project right from the time the pigs were delivered to the schools (after slaughter). Taher Chef Chris Murray (Chef Chris) was on sight to oversee the whole event and roast the pigs - while we all slept! Chef Chris and Food Service Director Diane worked with the FFA classes on culinary skills. Students got to see the pig roast from many different aspects, including, preparation (seasoning the pig), making homemade BBQ sauce, cooking "Mexican Sweet Corn", and preparing & seasoning roasted potatoes. We also taught students how to cut and core the fresh pineapple as well as make homemade apple desserts.



Chef Chris explained to students how managing a project like this is an overnight affair - basting, marinating and

hydrating the meat all through the night is a critical element of producing an outstanding final product. Chef Chris glazed and ornamented the final product to create a spectacular presentation.



Special guests attending the Pig Roast included: Thailand Exchange Program Leaders, Lodi Mayor Anne Groves Lloyd, Lodi Police Chief Wayne Smith, Fire Department Personnel, and members of the Lodi Enterprise. Principals Joe Jelinek (High School) and Derek Pertzborn (Middle School) were special guest pig carvers. Lodi student's energy around this project created an awesome atmosphere at both schools and it was an extremely rewarding project for Taher and Lodi students.

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Preparing for the Future - Supporting Career &

Technical Education

The School District was awarded grant funds to put toward the purchase of an Inventibles X Carve Pro CNC machine for the High School Fabrication Lab. The X Carve will allow students to design anything with a computer-aided design (CAD) program and then program the X Carve to cut it out of any non-metal sheet material up to one inch thick.

The uses for this machine are endless, but in industry, this type of machine is often used to produce parts or components for larger products. Our students will create project components as well as items that can be sold in our Fabrication Lab store.

The X Carve also uses software that our middle school students are familiar with, allowing for a quick transfer of skills.

May is Mental Health Month!

Mental Health Awareness Month was established in 1949 to increase awareness of the importance of mental health and wellness in America, and to celebrate recovery from mental illness. Mental Health Awareness Month strives to reduce/end the stigma that surrounds mental illness like deficit thinking and misconceptions.

Each May the Mental Health America (MHA) organization releases a number of activities based on a different theme. The 2022 theme is Back to Basics. After more than one year of pandemic living, many people have a heightened awareness of the impact stress,



anxiety and isolation can have on their health and well-being. The goal of Back to Basics is to provide foundational knowledge about mental health conditions. Mental Health America recognizes these three steps can have a positive impact on your mental health and the mental health of those you love.

- 1. Stay mentally healthy Creating positive routines can support your mental health and help build skills to use if you become aware of symptoms of a mental health condition. Food choices and nutrition, exercise, sleep, stress management, coping skills, and building a support system are aspects of mental health and wellbeing. Having routines and positive ways to promote mental health can positively impact one's overall well-being.
- 2. Recognize when you need help Occasional bad days are to be expected, but when something suddenly and significantly changes negatively or impacts your ability to function in a typical way, it is time to seek help. One goal of Mental Health Awareness Month is to reduce/end the stigma of seeking mental health support when it is needed.
- 3. Getting Help When you or someone you care about is experiencing mental health challenges, it is common to feel like no one can understand what you're going through. When seeking help it is important to think about your support system. For adults this can include family members, coworkers, and trusted friends. Children's support systems can include parents, other family members and trusted friends. Teachers and pupil service staff are also part of the children's support system at school. Your support system can help to access additional resources. Some options may include; learning more about the types of mental health professionals, seeking support groups or in-patient care, accessing local services, and finding therapy.

Hello Community Members,

It is so hard to believe we are in the last weeks of the 2021-2022 school year, and what a year it has been. It is great to continue to roll the COVID dial back to pre-COVID practices as the year has gone on. In addition to winding down one year we are deep in the throes of planning for the next year and using the Strategic Plan that our community helped develop during the spring of last year. Here is the outcome of that hard work and community

input.

In our building we have been focusing on two pillars of the Strategic Plan: "Preparing for the Future" and "Nurturing the Whole Child".

Preparing for the Future

To help kids "Prepare for the Future" we have been working hard on aligning our Literacy instruction practices. The next step in that journey will take place on May 13, during our Collaboration Day, when we will have nationally recognized literacy instruction expert, Dr. Jan Richardson, providing training to our staff around guided reading. During this training she will talk about components of guided reading and she will model lessons with some of our very own Lodi kids. Through this process, we will continue to build staff capacity to increase student reading achievement even more and to help kids be prepared for their future with great reading skills.

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Nurturing the Whole Child

This is something we worked on before the pandemic but it has become even more important now to make sure we are inspiring the emotional and physical wellbeing of each child and to foster belonging. The first step we take to support students in this area is to deliver instruction from the 2nd Step curriculum which focuses on topics like making friends, showing compassion, and having empathy and respect. The next component of this is surveying students three times per year to measure how they are feeling and what they are learning. Lastly, based on that survey information and input from teachers and families we offer small group instruction focused on topics such as "Making and Keeping Friends," "Social Skills," and "Problem Solving." About thirty percent of our student population are able to participate in these types of groups each cycle and we have at least three cycles per school year.

OSC Alumni and Current Families

As a district, we have been working on engaging the Lodi community and identifying ways to measure success. OSC has been working with Wisconsin Resource Center for Charter Schools (WRCCS) on how to share OSC's story. Some of this work has included Governance Board training and led the OSC Board to this short survey that is linked below and can be found by scanning the QR Code. OSC is interested in hearing from Alumni and current OSC families through this survey. We will use this information in our continuous improvement process and to help us identify additional ways to measure success for OSC.
