Community Priorities Drive the District

The Board of Education in the School District of Lodi engaged the community in a strategic planning process in the spring of 2021 which led to the adoption of a strategic plan by the Board in July of 2021. The District has been working hard over the past year to take these community priorities and put them into action. The District has developed balanced scorecards to document the high confidence strategies the district has chosen to use to meet the priorities set for us by the community. These scorecards can be found on the District's website and on the Strategic Plan page. The administration held a retreat with the Board to take a deeper dive into and review these balanced scorecards in January of 2022. More recently, the District invited all those who participated in the strategic planning process to a gallery walk at the June 2022 Board of Education meeting so they could get a better idea of what these high confidence strategies look like in action. A gallery walk is where Board members and community members in attendance rotate in small groups to different stations to listen and ask questions of staff members on the strategies being implemented across the District.

As we now move into the 2022-23 school year, we are developing new scorecards which will guide our work this coming year in meeting these priorities set for us by the community. The balanced scorecards will be posted to the Strategic Plan page on our website and be analyzed by staff throughout the year, with a formal review occurring for the Board of Education and community at midyear and the end of the 2022-23 school year.

As a District, we continue to ensure that the strategic plan remains a living and breathing document, not one that was created by the community and then put on a shelf. If one looks back at the scorecards, the work that was done in the District last year, and the decisions that were made in the District, it is easy to see the connection to the priorities laid out by the community. Our goal will continue to be ensuring that we are living the vision the community provided us which is: "In partnership with our community, nurturing every student's potential for growth and opportunities - socially, mentally, & academicallyin a safe, respectful, and an inclusive environment to create innovative problem solvers."

Asbestos Notification

Under AHERA (Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act), all primary and secondary schools are required to develop and implement a plan for managing all building materials which contain asbestos. Included in the AHERA Act is the requirement to annually notify all workers and building occupants (or their guardians) of asbestos-related activities.

Beginning in 1988, all buildings owned, leased, or "under the control of" the School District were inspected by EPA accredited inspectors, with building material samples analyzed by an independent laboratory. Based on the inspection, the School District prepared and the state approved a comprehensive management plan for managing the asbestos.

Where the asbestos-containing materials are found, the District has in place an Operations and Maintenance program.

The District has accomplished the following compliance mandates regarding the administration of asbestos in school buildings:

- Environmental Management Consulting, Inc. (EMC) was contracted to be the school's consultant for asbestos for the school year.
- The District is continuing with the Operations and Maintenance Program as designed for the School District. This ensures that all asbestos materials are kept in good condition.
- Periodic "surveillance" in each area containing asbestos has been completed every six months by our consultant. Also, the buildings
 are re-inspected by an accredited inspector every three years.
- In the past year the District has not conducted any asbestos removal activities

All outside contractors shall contact the lead maintenance person before commencing work. Our goal at the District is to be in full compliance with asbestos regulations.

A copy of the Asbestos Management Plan is available for review by contacting the District Office. Questions related to this plan or any other asbestos concerns should be directed to the District's Designated Person Mr. Neal Reible.

PUBLIC RELEASE SY 21/22 NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH AND BREAKFAST PROGRAMS

The Lodi School District announced its policy for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program. Each school office and the central office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The following household size and income criteria will be used for determining eligibility. Children from families whose annual income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free and reduced price meals

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a notice to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school (unless notified at the start of the school year that children are eligible through direct certification). Additional copies are available at the office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by agency or other program officials. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To obtain free or reduced price meals for children in a household where one or more household members receive FoodShare, Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), or Wisconsin Works (W-2) cash benefits, list the FoodShare, FDPIR or W-2 case number, program name, list the names of all school children, sign the application, and return it to the school office.

For the school officials to determine eligibility for free or reduced price meals of households not receiving FoodShare, FDPIR or W-2 cash benefits, the household must provide the following information requested on the application: names of all household members, total number of household members, and the adult signing the application form must also list the last four digits of his or her Social Security Number or mark the box to the right of "Check if no SSN". Also, the income received by each household member must be provided by amount and source (wages, welfare, child support, etc.).

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal policy Brent Richter, Business Manager will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent or guardian is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he/she may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If the parent/guardian wishes to make a formal appeal, he/she may make a request either orally or in writing to: Terry Haag, School Board Clerk 115 School Street, Lodi, WI 53555, phone 608/592-3851 ext 5482 or email haagte@lodischoolswi.org.

If a hearing is needed to appeal the decision, the policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

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If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size changes, the family should contact the school. Such changes may make the household eligible for reduced price meals or free meals if the household income falls at or below the levels shown above, and they may reapply at that time.

Children formally placed in foster care are also eligible for free meal benefits. Foster children may be certified as eligible without a household application. Households with foster children and non-foster children may choose to include the foster child as a household member, as well as any personal income available to the foster child, on the same application that includes their non-foster children.

The information provided by the household on the application is confidential. Public Law 103-448 limits the release of student free and reduced price school meal eligibility status to persons directly connected with the administration and enforcement of federal or state educational programs. Consent of the parent/guardian is needed for other purposes such as waiver of text book fees.

Non-discrimination Statement:

Summer Time = Busy Time

Summer is a busy time for the Business Office. A school's fiscal year begins on July 1st and ends on June 30th. This means we close up one set of books, prepare for an audit and begin the fiscal reporting process (to the state and federal governments) all while we start the new year, meaning contracts execution, employee benefits changes, purchasing, grant execution, and so much more. Why do schools have a financial audit? The Department of Public Instruction (DPI) has the statutory responsibility to prescribe financial and membership audit requirements. In a nutshell, not only is it prudent and incredibly important for a business, but it's a statutory requirement. Funding Schools:

Public schools in Wisconsin are funded with a combination of revenues including various state and federal education aids. In Lodi, state aids represent about 35-40 percent of school funding and federal aids represent approximately 5-10 percent of school funding. The remaining revenue sources are from local revenues, such as property taxes, materials fees, and rental fees. State aids are defined as either "General Aids" or "Categorical Aids." General aid is provided primarily through a formula that distributes aid on the basis of the relative fiscal capacity of each school district as measured by the district's per pupil value of taxable property. Categorical aids represent specific program costs and are paid on a formula basis or awarded as grants.

Today's Big Challenge?

When I'm out and about in the community, I often get asked what the biggest challenge I see facing our schools today is. Some people question, is it health insurance? While others ask, is it school funding? While these are two big challenges, my response is "the changing labor pool." That response is often greeted with a nod and a smile, as most people agree and see the world around us having the same issue. School districts have seen unprecedented staff transiency. Some schools have become very aggressive, employing very creative techniques to attract and retain staff. Because there is incredible competition for workers in schools today, the School District of Lodi is looking closely at how to recruit, attract and retain the best work force possible, which also happens to be one of the pillars of the School District of Lodi's Strategic Plan, "District Workforce". https://www.lodi.k12.wi.us/about/lodi-strategic-plan. Having a competitive wage is one of the key factors in keeping a strong workforce. The district is very thankful for such a wonderful and supportive community, which in a challenging economic climate, continues to support the schools by another passed referendum.

Preparing for the Future - Supporting Career & Technical Education



Department of Workforce Development

DWD Grant - Feedback provided from the community during the strategic planning process clearly identified future investments in Career and Technical Education (CTE) as a priority. During the 2021/2022 school year, after doing a walkthrough of our spaces with department leaders, it became apparent that outdated and ineffective equipment had to be updated to give students the experience and skills required to prepare them for industry. District leaders began looking at grant opportunities to support these much needed updates. Recently, the district was awarded another grant from the Department of Workforce Development. This grant is for \$19,200 and will be used to update welding equipment that was brought over long ago from the former High School. It will also be used to support a laser engraver and 3D printer. We are thankful for the continued support from the DWD!



Career and Technical Education (CTE) Incentive Grant - The School District of Lodi recently received word that nine students from the 2021 graduating class qualified for the CTE Incentive Grant. The district receives grant funds from the Department of Public Instruction for each student that successfully completes their high school career with an Industry Recognized Certification or Youth Apprenticeship (YA) experience. Youth Apprenticeship is a work-based learning experience that students can participate in while still attending Lodi High School. As a result, the district will receive up to \$9,000 to reinvest in YA and certification programs for future Lodi High School students.

Preparing for the Future - Academic Excellence



CAPP - Spanish V Dual Credit Update - During the 2020/2021 school year, the district decided to partner with the UW-Oshkosh Cooperative Academic Partnership Program (CAPP) to offer a dual credit option to students taking Spanish V at Lodi High School during the 2021/2022 school year.

Dual credit means that students are able to earn both high school and college credit. We are excited to announce

that six Lodi High School students from the class were able to leverage this program to not only earn five college credits for Spanish V but an additional 11 retro college credits (That's 16 college credits per student!).

Summer Professional Learning for Educators - Many of our teachers and administrators have also been busy this summer participating in professional development opportunities to refine teaching and learning practices. For example, this summer, the Middle School math department will dig deeper into a new math curriculum pilot for the 2022/2023 school year. Teacher leaders at the Elementary School and OSC will participate in a Phonics/Word Study training. In addition, multiple departments will meet to further align their curriculum to our Board adopted standards and make necessary updates. Ongoing training and alignment allow us to provide a world-class education to our students.

Innovative Community Connection - Community Connection Classroom Partnerships

Explore Our Community - A key component of the School District of Lodi Strategic Plan is focused on developing community connections. During the 2021/2022 school year, over 30 School District of Lodi educators started to develop opportunities for classrooms to connect with various business and service organizations in our community and region. We were incredibly excited to see this focus carry over into Summer School, where educators were able to facilitate a class called "Explore Our Community!" Nurturing the Whole Student

Pillar Two of the Strategic Plan is entitled "Nurturing the Whole Student." The Vision Element Study Team, which included over 100 community members, defined Nurturing the Whole Student as: "creating a sense of belonging by growing empathy and compassion, inspiring the emotional and physical wellbeing of each student." The School District of Lodi has identified Morning Meeting and Advisory as high impact strategies to make positive changes in our school community to nurture the whole student.

Morning Meeting is a strategy implemented at the Primary and Elementary School level. The purpose of Morning Meeting is to begin each day as a classroom community of caring and respectful learners who feel they belong to their classroom and school. There are four parts to the Morning Meeting: greeting, share, activity, and message. Students **greet** each other by name often including handshaking, singing, and/or movement. Students **share** their thoughts, feelings, and ideas in a positive way. Next, the whole class engages in a short, inclusive **activity** which reinforces learning and builds class cohesion through active participation. The final component is the message. Students discuss a daily **message** which is posted by their teacher. This message is read by teachers and students and the teacher engages the students in discussion based on the content. The message typically includes information about the daily schedule and reinforces academic skills in a meaningful and interactive way.

Advisory is a similar strategy implemented at the Middle and High School level. The purpose of Advisory is to establish trusting relationships (student-to-student and student-to-adult), teach the skills necessary for students to build positive relationships so they can enjoy responsible independence, make school meaningful and enjoyable, increase involvement and belonging in the classroom and school community, and prepare students to learn. There are four parts to Advisory: daily news, greeting, sharing, and activity. Students encounter the **daily news** to start an Advisory, which is posted by their teacher. Students read the message and follow a direction, complete a task, and/or start thinking about a topic provided in the daily news. The **greeting** provides opportunities to learn and practice formal, friendly, and fun formats for social interactions. Sharing is a time for community members to share about themselves. The purpose of **sharing** is to build relationships and connections among students and to develop skills of conversation, inquiry, and speaking within a group. Students engage in a short **activity** that provides opportunities to practice cooperation, responsibility, and self-control.

If you looked for me the summer I was sixteen, you would find me at one of the parks in my hometown of Monroe, Wisconsin. OSC 5th Grade Graduation


